



## Gads Hill Center— Its Neighbors and Its Job

Dear Friend:

Gads Hill Center is located in the old llth Ward, at 1919 West Cullerton St. The United States Census of 1910 showed that in this ward 85.4% of the population either were born in Europe or were the children of a father born in Europe. One may safely assume that of the remaining 14.6% the majority do not go back more than one generation in this country.

In the majority of homes the older members of the family speak a foreign language, read foreign language newspapers, and attend meetings of their own national societies. This helps to create a wide gap between parents and their children who are concerned only with becoming Americanized as quickly as possible. This, together with bad housing, commercialized recreation, and the lack of social consciousness, tends to break down morals. That this is not mere fancy appears in the fact that although by the Census of 1920 the 11th Ward had a population equal to but 2.2% of the population of Chicago it furnished last year 13% of the cases in the Juvenile Court.

The job of Gads Hill Center is to provide, so far as its resources permit, a way out for these children and to combat the conditions that are leading to deliquency. It provides a common meeting place and offers educational and recreational opportunities to every man, woman and child in the community.

The year-around usefulness of Gads Hill Center may be estimated both in terms of the comprehensive program which is offered and in the very considerable number of people, old and young, who take advantage of these opportunities. In 1921 the total attendance was over 86,000.

We should like you to know more about Gads Hill Center, its work and its problems. This folder will give you a little insight into its activities; a visit, if you find time, will accomplish much more. You will be welcome any time you find it convenient to call.
